As questions multiply, CDHA is focused on curating helpful resources and information to support dental hygienists and other oral health professionals during this challenging time to manage and rebound as best possible.

About today's federal announcement - aid package to support Canadians

Today, the government announced a sweeping \$27 billion relief package in direct payments to Canadians that will start in the next few weeks. Another \$55 billion was announced for tax deferrals (businesses and families). This first phase includes measures that will flow through programs that are already in place such as employment insurance and childcare benefits, for everyday Canadians who don't qualify for El. Subject to change, these programs will last for up to 14 weeks and applications will begin in April 2020.

 Emergency care benefit - up to \$900 bi-weekly, for up to 15 weeks as temporary income support for workers (including the self-employed) who are quarantined or sick with COVID-19 or who are taking care of a family member who is sick with COVID-19 but do not qualify for El sickness benefits; and parents with children who require care or supervision due to school closures, and are unable to earn employment income, irrespective of whether they qualify for El or not.

 COVID-19 emergency support benefits - payments (undisclosed amounts) to unemployed workers who are not eligible for EI (through the CRA, up to \$5.0 billion).

CDHA anticipates that all members will be covered by one or the other of the new El or equivalent measures. The central message was the national public health response should not be limited by financial considerations.

Additionally, for Canadians without paid sick leave (or similar workplace accommodation) who are sick, quarantined or forced to stay home to care for children, the government is:

- waiving the one-week waiting period for those individuals in imposed quarantine that claim Employment Insurance (EI) sickness benefits. This temporary measure will be in effect as of March 15, 2020.
- waiving the requirement to provide a medical certificate to access El sickness benefits.

The government is also offering measures for:

- eligible small employers, with a temporary wage subsidy for employers (10% of salaries or wages paid over period of three months).
- individuals currently in the process of repaying Canada Student Loans, with a six-month interest-free moratorium on the repayment of for all.
