
- I. Though most still report visiting an oral health professional yearly, 1 in 4 Canadians report their access to dental care services are different today from their prepandemic norm.

COVERAGE, ACCESS & BEHAVIOURS


- 1 in 4 Canadians report their access to dental care services changed in the pandemic and remains different today.
- 7 in 10 Canadians visit an oral health professional at least once a year. Most appointments were for routine check ups & exams, consistent with trends in 2020.
- 2 in 3 Canadians report having dental benefits coverage in 2023.
- In 2023, 1 in 5 Canadians report making an appointment directly with a dental hygienist at their own practice. Among under 30-year-old Canadians, this proportion jumps up to 1 in 3.
- The vast majority, 9 in 10 Canadians say they are comfortable attending a dental or dental hygiene appointment today even in the context of COVID-19 transmission risks.
- Over 8 in 10 Canadians who have visited a dental hygienist have discussed proper oral health care techniques with their dental hygienist, a notable increase from 2020 (+15 % pts).




FREQUENCY ACCESSING DENTAL SERVICES





CHANGE IN ACCESS TO DENTAL SERVICES DUE TO COVID-19







COMFORT LEVELS ATTENDING A DENTAL/DENTAL HYGIENE APPOINTMENT




NEARLY 2 IN 10 CANADIANS HAVE MADE AN APPOINTMENT WITH A DENTAL HYGIENIST DIRECTLY





LEVELS OF COMFORT SEEING A DENTAL HYGIENIST IN THEIR OWN PRACTICE










FEDERAL FUNDING FOR IMPROVED ACCESS TO DENTAL CARE


- 2 in 3 Canadians are familiar with the Government of Canada implementing a national dental care program.
- The vast majority who have heard of the program support it and believe that the program will at least somewhat improve access to dental care.
- When the basics of the program are explained to both those aware & unaware of the program, 9 in
 10 Canadians say they support the initiative.
- Though most Canadians believe the program should prioritize both preventative and restorative work, of those who only choose one priority, a preventative emphasis is more popular.

AWARENESS OF NATIONAL DENTAL PLAN/FUNDING






SUPPORT FOR NATIONAL DENTAL PLAN/FUNDING AFTER DESCRIPTION



As you may or may not know, in 2022 the Government of Canada announced it would put 3 billion dollars over five years to provide dental care for Canadians with family incomes of less than \$90,000 annually, starting with under 12 years-olds in 2022, expanding to under 18 years-olds, seniors, and persons living with a disability in 2023, with full implementation by 2025.




VAST MAJORITY BELIEVE PROGRAM WILL IMPROVE ACCESS TO DENTAL CARE SERVICES















ORAL HEALTH CHALLENGES FACED BY SENIORS






IMPRESSIONS OF THE CURRENT STATE OF ORAL HEALTH SERVICES IN LONG-TERM CARE HOMES

METHODOLOGY

The survey was conducted with 2,000 Adult Canadians aged 18 and over, from January 26th to 31st, 2023. A random sample of panelists were invited to complete the survey from a set of partner panels based on the Lucid exchange platform. These partners are typically double opt-in survey panels, blended to manage out potential skews in the data from a single source.

The margin of error for a comparable probability-based random sample of the same size is +/- 2.19%, 19 times out of 20.

The data were weighted according to census data to ensure that the sample matched Canada's population according to age, gender, and region. Totals may not add up to 100 due to rounding.

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
